For providers currently prescribing inhaled albuterol

Dear providers,

If you currently prescribe inhaled albuterol for patients with asthma, please note that low dose inhaled corticosteroid (ICS)/formoterol (e.g., budesonide/formoterol or Symbicort) is now the preferred reliever medication for patients \geq 12 years of age for all categories of asthma severity.

- Guideline recommendations: This based on recent guidelines from the Global Initiative for Asthma (GINA). For a summary of the GINA guidelines, visit <u>tinyurl.com/y5aqvnod</u>.
- Data: As-needed low dose ICS-formoterol reduced the risk of severe exacerbations by about twothirds compared to short-acting β2 agonist (SABA)-only treatment in adults and adolescents with mild asthma. This was the case in patients both with and without concurrent maintenance controller therapy.
- HPSM coverage of ICS/formoterol products:
 - o MEDI-CAL, CCS, HEALTHWORX: generic budesonide/formoterol
 - o CAREADVANTAGE CAL MEDICONNECT: brand Symbicort

Please Note: SABA (e.g., albuterol) is still the recommended rescue inhaler for 1) children between the ages of 6 to 11 years of age and 2) patients taking combination ICS-LABA medications with a different LABA (e.g., Advair).
